Why Adopt a Senior


Older dogs and cats are often overlooked for younger, energetic, cute puppies and kittens. Without question, puppies and kittens are adorable, but they also require a lot of work and have a lot to learn. Puppies love to chew on almost anything, where seniors will most likely know to chew on their own things and not yours. Seniors also are more likely to be already housebroken and know basic commands. Kittens may need to learn that scratching on your furniture is off limits, where adult cats know what a scratching post is for.

Sadly, even the best dogs and cats can find their way to a shelter, no matter how good they were or how much they've been loved. According to the ASPCA, the most common reason for why people give up their pets is because they are moving to a place that doesn't allow them. Other reasons include an owner passing away, divorce and financial difficulties.

Many people shy away from adopting a senior because they feel their time is limited. This may be true, but think of it as quality of time; not quantity. It's true that seniors may have fewer years, but they deserve to be rescued too. Ask anybody who has adopted an adult dog or cat; they can tell you that their is no greater bond.

All pets love unconditionally, but senior pets love more deeply. For an old dog or cat, the cruelest fate is dying without love, comfort or warmth.

Despite all their positive benefits, older pets are not without problems. When you bring home an older animal, be patient. Give them a warm soft bed and lots of love. Don't be alarmed if they sleep a lot the first few days and aren't interested in eating or drinking. Give them time to acclimate. Older cats, in particular, need time and

TNR Program

The Purrz ladies are still working diligently on TNR for community cats in the Corning and Painted Post areas.

With kitten season starting around the beginning of April, our goal is to decrease the number of kittens born and improve the health of the colonies where the trapping is taking place. This past year approximately 60 cats/kittens went through our TNR program. Out of that number 25 of the kittens that were trapped were able to be socialized and adopted into loving homes.

There is a lot more to be done. It really does take all of us to solve this problem and we appreciate everyone that is working hard to do their part.





Dental Disease and Your Pets

Did you know, by the age of 3, 70% of cats



and 80% of dogs have some form of dental disease? It's not just a senior pet problem.

Dental disease can lead to other health issues in your pet, such as heart, kidney and liver disease. Periodontal disease can destroy bone and tissue that can cause jaw fractures. Tooth Resorption is a condition that affects cats more than dogs. This is a very painful condition where their teeth will erode caused by lesions.

Signs that your pet may have periodontal disease include bad breath, difficulty chewing hard food, sensitivity around their mouth, nose or eyes, bleeding from their mouth, weight loss or doesn't seem to have their usual appetite.

Prevention is the key. The best way to prevent dental disease in cats and dogs is by brushing their teeth. If brushing isn't an option, there are other ways that can help keep tartar from building in your pet's mouth such as dental wipes, oral rinses and dental chews.


